



## Everardo "Eddie" Villegas

July 8, 1928 - August 29, 2020

Everardo "Eddie" Villegas, aged 92, passed away on Saturday, August 29, 2020. He was born in San Antonio, Texas to Julian and Maria Luisa Villegas

He is preceded in death by his wife Rosa, his son Daniel Zamora, his brothers, Pedro Villegas, Julian Villegas, and Carlos Villegas. He is survived by sisters, Herminia Watkins, Josephine Valdivia, Leonor Valdivia, and brother Luis Villegas (Carolyn). He is also survived by his children, David Zamora (Libby), Vincent Villegas (Esther), Elias Villegas (Cassie), and Marcella Villegas-Garcia (Richard). He had 12 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren.

Everardo was born during the Roaring 20's, at a time when the economy was booming and life was good. He would say that in the beginning, his parents had a good home and lived a comfortable life. Soon however, the economy was greatly affected by the stock market crash of 1929, which set into motion an economic downfall known as The Great Depression. When Everardo was still a young boy of about 8 or 9, his father began feeling ill. Still struggling with the daily cost of raising a family, symptoms from illness were often ignored and trips to the doctor were often overlooked. Everardo's father began experiencing stomach pains which would later prove to have been a ruptured appendix. He succumbed to the illness and died leaving the family without any source of income. In elementary school, Everardo became known as a troublemaker. Life was not easy, and he had been dealt many challenges. The economy was bad, and his mother could not afford to give her children much more than the most essential things. Young boys would often pick on Everardo because of his clothes. Landing in the principal's office was a common thing. Even though he had been provoked by his classmates, it was often Eddie that landed in the office. One day the principal sent him home and told him not to come back to school until he brought his mother in for a conference. Unfortunately, it was during the Depression and if his mother was to come, she would lose her job. Young Eddie never returned. He would leave behind any formal schooling by 3rd grade.

Life in those days was rough. Medical knowledge, the separation of the classes and simple poverty, often made tragedy a sad but common occurrence. His older brother Pedro became ill and died at the age of 15 from tuberculosis. His younger sister, Virginia,

was accidentally shot and killed by a police officer in the crossfire with a robber as she walked home from school. The incident happened in September of 1944. She had just finished registering at school and was walking to the bus stop with her mother. As they rounded the corner she was hit in the chest and died in her mother's arms. Life continued and his mother remarried and had three daughters with her second husband. She lived happily until her death from breast cancer at the age of forty-five.

As a young man, barely in his teens, Everardo left his home to explore the West Coast. He and a friend hitched rides on trains and made their way to California. Two young boys with no money and no prospects did what they could to find quick work and adventure. They worked odd jobs as they traveled by rail. It was at this time that a business owner saw Everardo and asked him what he was doing walking around during school hours. He asked Everardo to clean his business which was a shop called Crown's Tailor for a few coins. It was that fateful encounter that would bring about the man he was destined to become. Everardo quickly became a student of tailoring and had created his first suit by the age of 17.

Life has a way of introducing tangents. In 1945, at the age of 16, Everardo did what many young men would, and enlisted in the Air Force. The United States was in World War II and many young men would lie about their age to serve their country. Everardo became a part of the 13th Air Force and was sent to Clark Air Base in the Philippines. Everardo would say that many of the young men would become seasick on the ship throughout the journey but that he had avoided that destiny by always keeping his eye on the horizon. He remained with the air force until the end of the war when many of the soldiers were released and sent home.

After the war, Everardo continued to fine tune his tailoring skills. He had confidence in his skill and quickly became an expert of design. His employer, Mr. Sol Frank, took notice of Eddie's talent and confidence and quickly put him in charge of the tailoring department. At first, many were uncertain of what to make of the young man who was put in charge. Some tested his authority, but Eddie quickly flattened any unrest by demonstrating those skills for which his boss had taken notice. One example recalled, was the day that the military had brought in a uniform that soldiers were required to wear in combat. The soldiers complained that the coat made it difficult to shoot their firearms because of the constricting design. Veteran tailors were discussing possible alterations. Eddie had always had the gift of design and quickly saw the solution in his mind's eye. He confidently approached the table and shared with his boss, military spokesperson and veteran tailors how an adjustment in the sleeve would quickly solve the issue. He proceeded to rip into the uniform and quickly create his vision alteration. The military spokesperson tried on the

jacket and decreed the alteration exactly what was needed! From this point forward, there was new respect for the young, head tailor.

Love has a way of making itself known. At this time a young widow caught his eye. Her name was Rosa. A co-worker made a love match lunch date to take place near San Antonio's Brackenridge Park. They strolled the Sunken Gardens and took a photo which would become the iconic representation of their love for the family. To this day, that photo remains one of the family favorites. Eddie fell in love with Rosa's two sons, Daniel and David. Everardo and Rosa married and had three more children, Vincent, Elias and Marcella.

As time moved on, Eddie and Rosa decided to venture out on their own and create their very own business, Eddie's Tailor Shop. The shop would become an icon in the downtown area and many local leaders, political figures and San Antonio residents would elevate the mom and pop business to one of the premiere tailor shops in San Antonio. It was at this time, Irving Frank, the owner of Sol Frank, who also happened to be good friends with Lyndon B. Johnson, made a call to Eddie. LBJ at the time was Vice-President of the United States. Vice-President Johnson needed a tailor. Frank knew just the man that he would want for this special assignment. He called Eddie and told him of his plans. Eddie, of course, said yes immediately! The modest neighborhood on the southside of San Antonio was soon set upon by secret service men asking neighbors about the man that lived next door. Eddie would recall one of his neighbors asking him what he had done and why were government officials asking questions about him. Imagine their surprise to hear him say, ever so nonchalantly, that he was being considered as a possible tailor to the vice-president of the United States. Lyndon B. Johnson would keep Eddie as his tailor and friend until his death in January of 1973.

Eddie and Rosa continued building their lives surrounded by love and family for many years. Over their 50 years of marriage, Everardo and his wife lived a life of service. It was not uncommon to come home to find a stranger sharing a dinner and even a room for a night or longer. They helped many people find their path in life.

In 2002, the couple celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at Fort Sam Officer's Club in San Antonio. It was a wedding of a lifetime and one in which their love shone for all to see. Rosa would die that next summer of 2003 with her love by her side. For the next seventeen years Everardo never forgot about his love. His last request to his son Vincent was never forgotten. On August 29, 2020, Everardo Villegas's body was driven by his home on Stanley Street on the southside of San Antonio. The hearse stopped for a few moments in front of their old home, so that Eddie could pick up Rosie for their final journey together. Son, Vincent, made sure to fill this last request.
