SARAH WAS BORN IN WESTBROOK, TX. TO MAC AND ORA HARPER. SARAH GRADUATED FROM ABILENE CHRISTIAN COLLEGE IN 1945. SHE MARRIED HARDY D. CANNON IN MAY 1955. SHE WAS A 3RD GRADE SCHOOL TEACHER IN THE HARLANDALE AND SOMERSET SCHOOL DISTRICTS FOR 41 YEARS. SARAH AND HARDY WERE DEVOUT CHRISTIANS AND A MEMBER OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST. SHE IS PRECEDED IN DEATH BY HER HUSBAND HARDY, 2 SISTERS MAXINE PARKER AND VELMA ACKERMANN AND GRANDDAUGHTER AMANDA CANNON. SHE IS SURVIVED BY HER 3 SONS, JOE, JIM AND MARVIN AND DAUGHTER IN LAWS, 5 GRANDCHILDREN, 8 GREAT GRANDCHILDREN, 1 GREAT GREAT GRANDDAUGHTER ON THE WAY AND NUMEROUS NEICES AND NEPHEWS. I was so lucky to have visited with them at their wonderful place off Applewhite Road. They showed me around with an almost childlike enthusiasm. The place was a garden of delights for a history buff like me. I loved the old airplanes and various antique tools that were a part of the scenery. I remember that Hardy had a rather large mobile home-like building that was set up like a museum of barbed wire!. He had all kinds, and each one was labeled and categorized. Sarah spoiled me by baking me cookies and wonderful apple cakes. Sometimes she brought them to me freshly warm from the oven. After Hardy died, I was amazed at Sarah's resilience. She continued to be the joyful person she always was, continuing with the outreach program. Sarah, due to severe vision problems, did not drive, but she could work in a school all day if I could find transportation for her. Sometimes that ride to and from was me, and how I enjoyed helping her. Sarah, with her prior teaching experience, had developed the stamina to continue presentations for a full working day, alone, well into old age. And she sometimes added presentations to "After School Care" groups after the closing bell rang. She sported her own brand of sweet toughness. Rest in peace, dear Hardy and Sarah. I am so glad I knew and worked with you. My deepest condolences go to the Cannon family. I know you cherish your own special memories of these two wonderful people.
