



Benjamin Rosales

May 17, 1959 - July 18, 2019

Benjamin Rosales passed away on July 18, 2019 in San Antonio, Texas. Benjamin was born May 17, 1959 in Harlingen TX. He was preceded in death by his father Jose A. Rosales; sister, Dr. Anna Marie Rosales-Lozano and step-father, Felix Salazar. He is survived by his mother Janie Rosales-Salazar; sister, Jackie Redwine; nieces, Hannah Redwine and Elena Lozano; nephews, Joshua Redwine and Estevan Lozano.

Ben was a graduate of Thomas Edison High School class of '77, then continued his studies at USC from 1978 through 1980 in Film Production. He earned his Communications-Journalism Film/Video BA at Trinity University in 1984. Realizing he was destined to teach, like his father, he studied at UTSA from 1988 through 1990 to earn his teaching certification.

While studying, Ben earned his scuba certification and went treasure hunting off the coasts of Key West and Honduras while only eating whatever was caught and he was not a fan of seafood. It was a life-changing experience. He was a waiter at The Fairmount Hotel fine dining restaurant, Polo's. He met many stars and local high-profile residents, and always had a story to tell about his experiences working there.

He started his first of two teaching positions at Christa McAuliffe Middle School in 1991 as the originating Journalism teacher and developed a

national award-winning Journalism program. His yearbooks won numerous state and national competitions. He moved to Highlands High School in 2000 where his Journalism program won numerous awards for Yearbook, Newspaper and Photography. At both schools, he worked very hard with his students to fundraise to cover the expense of the yearbook and conventions and competitions they attended. Sadly, his health declined and he was forced to retire in 2015. His legacy is the numerous lives impacted by his passion for teaching students to look at life through the lens of world events.

His love of film and politics was known to anyone who conversed with him. As a teen, Ben would spend the entire day watching the same movie multiple times. He was an usher at the Broadway theatre while in high school, and was the lone usher during the summer blockbuster release of Jaws. He saw it so many times he could recite the lines from memory. His breadth of knowledge of film trivia was amazing and he would light up while discussing it. As he got older, he was known to sit around the dinner table quizzing his nieces and nephews about movies, world events, and politics. As a big believer in being a voice for the underdog and Democratic Party, Ben had many a rousing dialogue of politics.

Benjamin Rosales was a wonderful, intelligent, and kind man. He was a loving and caring son, brother, uncle, and friend. He spent his life dedicated to his students. As a patient, he appreciated all the wonderful care he received throughout the years and only had good things to say about his providers and fellow patients. He will be dearly missed and always remembered.

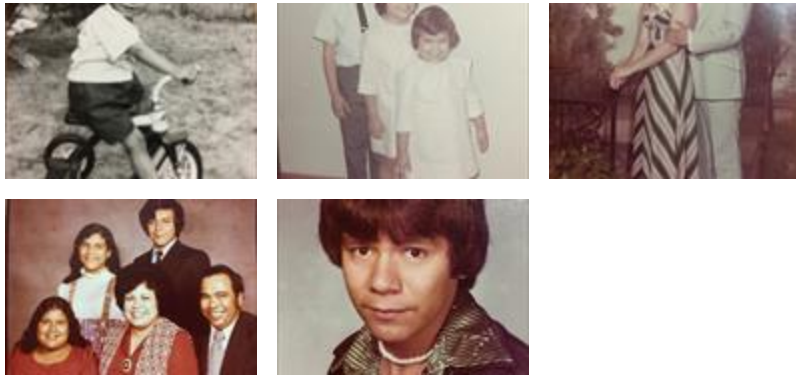
