Betty Jane Dees Butler Watson, born October 2, 1929 in Vivian, Louisiana, died Saturday, December 23, 2006 at the age of 77. Betty Watson enjoyed life. Each year she looked forward to making a trip to the coast to cook in a different kitchen and see a different vista. When she ceased traveling as part of her wifely duties Italy, France, Austria, Germany, Morocco, the Azores, Portugal she continued to travel to see her children and grandchildren on the West Coast, New York, Colorado, Nevada, Florida, Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana and then followed every wedding and family reunion to explore even more - from Mexico to Montana. Even though she was a very ill her next plan was to buy a Mini-Winnebago and explore more of the United States. She also enjoyed strong friendships over many generations and was proud to be a member of one of the longest running “Bunko” games in San Antonio.

She loved and supported many San Antonio institutions including the zoo, the Witte Museum and the Women's Bar Foundation. She was a charter member of the Smithsonian's Indian Heritage Museum as well. She offered shelter to many stray dogs and cats over the years, adopting them with the same love as her children. Finally, she was a deeply spiritual woman. Regular church attendance was deferred to cooking, but she still worshipped every day of her life and maintained her membership in the Rose Hill Baptist Church in Texarkana, Texas. She will be missed by all of her family and many, many friends.
