David was the most beautiful baby boy with stunning features that could not be denied. David was witty, intelligent, mischievous and strong who lived life to the fullest making friends and touching lives as he grew. David graduated high school from Lincoln High, Palestine, Texas in 1953.

After high school, David planned on joining the U.S. Air Force. He was all set and on his way to San Antonio, Texas to be sworn in when David decided to stop at the State Fair in Dallas, Texas to meet some girls, thus he never made it. Some months later he was drafted into the U.S. Army where he served in the Korean War. Once he returned from the war, David landed in Greenville, Texas where he attended and graduated from The Dallas Institute of Funeral Services with a degree in Mortuary Science.

David was a traveling man with an adventurous spirit which led him next to Chicago, Illinois where he worked in his Aunt's Funeral Home. His next stop was Amarillo, Texas where he was briefly married, and David O. Fitzpatrick Jr. was born. Back to Greenville he went in 1958 where he met and fell love with his soul mate Myrtie Constance Jackson, they married in 1959 and

immediately headed for the land of opportunity, Northern California. Once in California, David set out to provide an amazing life with promises of being rich to his wife. Well, soon came the exciting news that a baby was coming and on December 12th a baby girl was born who they named Sabrina Rochelle. David began working in the Morgue at The Sequoia Hospital, Redwood City, California which afforded him the opportunity to further increase his knowledge of Mortuary Science. To David and Myrtie's surprise 5 years later they yet again received the news a baby was coming. Since they already had a girl of course he wanted a boy. On October 12th they received the news "It's A Girl" who they named Deenean Yolanda. After a few years he went onto begin working at the United States Postal Service. David did what it took to provide for his family which included working three jobs. He never complained, said he was tired or made excuses he just got it done! His hard work paid off and he was proud but there was something missing. David had a passion for Community Service and there were several problems in the city where he lived. At that moment he became involved and set out to obtain a seat on the City Council of Menlo Park, California.
