



James Len Blackwood

April 9, 1941 - January 22, 2026

James Len Blackwood, a legendary coach, mentor, and storyteller whose impact on athletes and institutions spanned more than four decades, passed away peacefully at home on January 22, 2026, surrounded by those he loved. James was a devoted husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather, and an inspiring leader whose passion for sport was always rooted in people.

Born April 9, 1941, in Abilene, Texas, to Len Albert Blackwood and Gladys Florence Blackwood, James was an accomplished athlete long before he became a celebrated coach. In 1959, he helped lead the Abilene High School Eagles to a state championship, running on the mile relay team and placing second in the 880-yard run at the state track meet. He earned a track scholarship to Abilene Christian College, where he competed on the Wildcats' distance medley relay team, which was ranked second in the world in 1961.

James began his coaching career in 1963 at Mann Junior High in Abilene, launching what would become a remarkable 44-year journey in coaching and athletic leadership. Early success followed quickly. As a volunteer assistant track coach at Cooper High School, he helped guide the Cougars to a 1964 state championship. From there, his reputation as an exceptional track and cross-country coach grew.

At Corpus Christi Ray High School, James led the cross-country team to a

state championship in 1965, and a second-place finish the following year. His two-mile relay team set a Texas Relays record in 1967 and recorded the fastest time in the nation. He later coached at Corpus Christi King High School and Richardson High School, where his teams consistently excelled at the state level. Over his high school coaching career, more than 30 of his athletes earned college track and field scholarships.

In 1972, James joined the University of Texas at Austin as assistant track coach, head cross-country coach, and associate director of the Texas Relays. During his tenure, his teams won 13 Southwest Conference championships and finished in the national top 10 on 10 occasions. In 1985, James became the recruiting coordinator for the Texas Longhorns football program and helped build the team that won the 1990 Southwest Conference championship and posted a nationally ranked 10–2 season. Ultimately, 25 of his players went on to play in the NFL.

James played a key role in collegiate athletics nationwide, serving as associate director for five NCAA national championships and directing NCAA District 6 cross-country championships for 13 years. He also co-directed the first UIL high school cross-country meet in Texas. His career included time with the Houston Astros front office and a coaching stop at the University of Southern Mississippi.

James' final coaching home was the University of Texas at San Antonio, where he was a track & field coach for nine seasons, from 1999-2000 to 2007-08. He spent the last seven seasons as head coach of the women's program. During his time with the Roadrunners, he coached All-Americans Ryanne Dupree and Rhonda Ray, along with more than 60 all-conference performers and over 25 conference champions.

Throughout his career, James coached 71 NCAA All-Americans at the

University of Texas, seven at UTSA, and 17 Olympians. Many extraordinary athletes proudly called him "Coach," including Eric Metcalf, Johnny Lam Jones, Henry Marsh, Patrick Sang, and James Lott. Yet for all his accolades, James was most proud of the relationships he built and the lives he influenced.

Beyond coaching, James was known as a gifted storyteller, always ready with a laugh, a memory, or a lesson drawn from experience. He believed deeply in the power of sport to shape character and instill confidence, and he never stopped cheering for his athletes long after their competitive days were over.

James would readily say the greatest win of his life was his wife, Susan. It was fitting that sport brought them together with James as a track coach at UT and Susan coordinating track meets as an assistant athletic director at the UIL. They began dating in 1986 and were married in 1989. True teammates in every sense, they supported one another's careers with pride, encouragement and deep respect. Their love and partnership remain a lasting example to all who knew them.

James' legacy lives on through his family, the countless athletes he inspired, the colleagues he mentored, and the friends who cherished his warmth, wisdom, and humor. He will be remembered not only for his extraordinary career but for the heart, generosity and joy he brought to every chapter of his life.

James is survived by his wife, Dr. Susan Blackwood; daughter, Jessica Lyn Kidd; granddaughter, Taylor Lyn Douglass (Evan); and great-granddaughter, Ella Jade Douglass.

James formed close bonds with his caregivers, and the family especially

wishes to thank Cierra Crumedy, Yvonne Dominguez, Zhaquae Moragne, Angel Ttacomulco, Tiffany De La Torres and Nora Casarez for their love and expertise.
