Joseph Camarano, 96, one of seven sons born to Giuseppe and Camela Camarano on May 14, 1911 in Boston, Massachusetts, passed away on Thursday, October 4, 2007. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife of 58 years, Agatha, in 1994, and his son Richard, in 2006. Joe is survived by his oldest son Warren J. Camarano and his wife, Margie and their three children, Laurel New husband Nathan of Austin, Joel wife Rachel of San Antonio, and Cheryl Watson husband James of Louisville, Kentucky. He also leaves his two great grandsons, Joseph and Anthony Camarano of San Antonio and his daughter-in-law, Mary Lou Camarano of Cortland, New York and her children, Sean and Kimberly. Prior to WWII, Joe was employed in Massachusetts by General Motors, Chevrolet Division. He served his country as a ship builder during the war, most notably building the aircraft carrier, LEXINGTON, currently moored in Corpus Christi. Following the war, Joe worked for over 30 years for Garland Knitting Mills in Massachusetts. Upon his retirement from Garland in 1976, Joe and Agatha moved to Lakeland Florida where they enjoyed sunshine and lack of New England snow. Joe and Agatha resettled to San Antonio in 1990 to be closer to their Texas family members. Visitation for Joe will be held Tuesday, October 9, 2007 from 2PM to 4PM and also 6PM to 8PM at Mission Park Funeral Chapels North. A graveside service will be Wednesday, October 10, 2007 at 10AM at Mission Burial Park North.
