“ So much of Mom's life involved Brooks Air Base (met Dad who was stationed there in the Army Air Corps) then after WWII she was a civilian employee of the Air Force at 'Brooks' for about 20 + years. She was secretary to the head of officer personnel management. She earned numerous Sustained Superior Performance awards/citations and assisted her boss by typing, proofreading, and correcting grammatical aspects of his Masters Thesis. She processed paperwork for space pioneers including Col. John P. Stapp and the early astronauts when they were involved in training and medical activities at the School/Center for Aerospace Medicine, Brooks AFB. She was deputized by the Department of State(DoS) to process passports for personnel traveling abroad to attend space and medical conferences; a task that normally required extensive training but instead she was handed a thick manual from DoS to study and follow on her own.
