Linda Devora Flores went to be with the Lord on May 12, 2026, in San Antonio, Texas, at the age of 82.

Linda was born on July 6, 1943, in Floresville, Texas, to Enrique Sr. and Rosie Devora. She graduated from Floresville High School and worked at Miller Curtain Company before beginning a long and distinguished career at Kelly Air Force Base. During her years at Kelly, she held several positions, including serving as a jet engine mechanic working on F-15 aircraft. Through hard work, determination, and dedication, she built a career of which she was extremely proud. Linda often reflected on her years at Kelly Air Force Base and the accomplishments she achieved there before retiring in September 1999.

In 1991, Linda married Enrique J. Flores. Together they shared nearly 35 years of marriage filled with love, friendship, faith, and adventure. Following her retirement, Linda and Enrique enjoyed traveling throughout the country in their RV, taking cruises, visiting Indian casinos, and making memories wherever the road led them. Whether traveling across the country or simply spending time together at home, they treasured the life they built together.

Faith was the foundation of Linda's life. Alongside her husband, Enrique, she devoted countless hours to serving her church and community. Together they volunteered for many years at San Juan Capistrano Catholic Church, helping

with festivals, fundraisers, and community events. At the time of her passing, Linda and Enrique were devoted parishioners of St. Jerome Catholic Church and had previously been proud members of St. Margaret Mary Catholic Church. Linda loved the Lord deeply, and her faith guided the way she lived her life, treated others, and served those around her.

Linda loved softball and spent many years on the field, first as a player and later as a coach and team mom. She was passionate about supporting young people and was always willing to volunteer her time wherever it was needed. She also loved music and dancing. Whether it was cumbia, merengue, cha-cha, salsa, bachata, or Tejano music, Linda was always ready to dance. She especially loved the music of Emilio Navaira and Selena and passed her love of music and dance on to her daughter.

Of all the roles she held throughout her life, the one she cherished most was being a mother. Linda spent countless hours taking her daughter Gina to Flamenco classes, recitals, performances, softball games, and every activity that mattered to her. She was the mother in the audience, the team mom on the sidelines, the coach offering encouragement, and the safe place waiting at home. She believed in showing up for the people she loved and demonstrated that commitment every day through her actions.

Linda was known for her generous spirit and compassionate heart. She quietly supported numerous charitable organizations and causes that were dear to her, including Native American schools, animal rescue organizations, and other nonprofits dedicated to helping those in need. She had a lifelong love for animals, especially dogs. Over the years she lovingly cared for many cherished canine companions, including Mardi, Chumina, Bear 2, Prieto, Lucky, Gracie and Bear 1.

More than anything, Linda will be remembered for the way she made people

feel. She made others feel welcomed, valued, loved, and important. Her kindness was genuine, her generosity was quiet, and her love was freely given. She celebrated the successes of others, offered comfort during

difficult times, and never hesitated to help someone in need. Her warmth, strength, faith, and compassion touched countless lives and left an impact that will never be forgotten.

Even during the difficult years of her illness, Linda's love for her family never faded. The values she lived by, the lessons she taught, and the countless memories she created remain a lasting gift to those who knew and loved her.

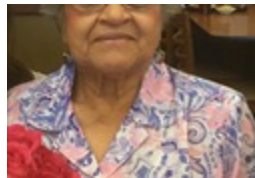
