BONE

Odis Bone died March 27, 2011 at the age of 89. Pop, as he was affectionately known by his family, was born in Oklahoma on October 18, 1921 to Edward and Ann Mae Nail Bone who preceded him in death. He was also preceded in death by his wife, Ordie Mae. Mr. Bones' parents died when he was 11 years old. He spent the next four years in an orphanage leaving at the age of 15 to be on his own. Mr. Bone joined the U.S. Army and served during World War II where he was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds he received during The Battle of The Bulge. During this time he attained the rank of Sergeant and was mentioned in a couple of New York newspapers and later in a book about World War II. In 1987 he was consulted about his memories of a specific battle by an artist wanting to paint an accurate scene of the battle. After his years of service in the U. S. Army, he worked several jobs before being employed by the Alamo Diaper Service where he retired in the early 1980's. He spent most of retirement in the Smithwick community east of Marble Falls. In 2010, Mr. Bone was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. He is survived by his daughter, Dixie Hughes; grandson, Randel Hughes and Teri; granddaughter, Wendy Shilling, granddaughter, Lori Shilling and Evan, great grandson, David Hughes; and numerous other great grandchildren, nieces, nephews and many friends he made throughout his life.
