Otis Clayton Skiles, 78, of Little Elm, passed away on October 16, 2015, in Frisco, Texas. He was born on November 29, 1936, in San Antonio, Texas.

Clayton attended St. Mary's University for two years and received his Associates Degree from Amarillo College. Clayton's first job was with Muir Investments. He later went to work for Scobey Moving and Storage and that is where he met his wife, Judy.

Clayton married Judy Caroline Zerr on August 11, 1962, in D'Hanis. He later went to work at Medina Base and was then transferred to Pantex Plant in Amarillo, TX, in 1966.
